The Department of Sociology held three virtual meetings, on 5th, 17th and 28th June, respectively, via Google Meet. The meeting was attended by all the faculty members.



Department of Sociology


The Department of Sociology organized a lecture series from 21st to the 29th of June, 2021. A follow up talk series to be held at 1st July, 2021.


(1). Pure mathematics: It includes Analysis, Algebra, Geometry, Modern mathematics, Combinatorics & Number system should be read as Number theory, etc...

POEM


DAYS ARE GONE
